## In Memoriam

On the 23<sup>rd</sup> of December our Lodge sadly, lost W Bro Ivor Roberts who was the third initiate into our Lodge after its consecration. He went on to serve as the WM and for many years as the DC in Vivary. He was also a founder member and Past WM of the Somerset Farmers Lodge and a Past WM of Queens College – his old school. His contribution to Freemasonry had been recognised with Grand Lodge Honours as a PAGDC.

Ivor, latterly assisted by his two sons, was an extremely successful farmer at Bradford on Tone and it was in the village Church of St Giles that his funeral was held. A packed congregation paid their respects and contributed with a resounding rendering of “We plough the field and scatter”. Six grandsons acted as bearers for the coffin and a guard of honour of Freemasons, who saluted with the sign of reverence, lined the path from the church.

The words that one should “Live respected and die regretted” were most appropriate for W Bro Ivor. It is a great loss for the Lodge but even more so for his wife Gill and his family.
