# Charity Steward's Report

Charity is a core value of Masonry and we thus encourage our members to set up either a regular donation, or ad hoc contributions as their personal circumstances allow. There are a number of existing subscriptions due for renewal and a number of our newer members I will approach over the coming months. Our current relief chest balance is: £12,106.87

Our Relief Chest offers our members the opportunity to propose charities in the local community, or wider, to donate our funds to. Having recently been to the Provincial Charity Stewards meeting at which there were some useful briefings, it is a key aim of mine to ensure we make the most of the communications opportunity to publicise our donations to increase Vivary Lodge's profile. This directly links to the opportunity to attract new members, under the banner of the Membership challenge.

Finally, Graham Puddy has notified me that Province are planning a new festival – Festival 2031. The Festival Chest is opened now, and I propose we transfer £4,000 of our funds into the account. This will give us a healthy interest rate of base rate +1.75%, and set us up for the beginning of the Festival.

#### Ceremonies from 2022-23

November 2022 saw the Initiation of Bro John Brannam.

December 2022 was our normal Christmas Meeting, with our Festive Board shared with our Ladies and other non-Masonic guests.

Our January 2023 meeting included an Initiation Ceremony, for Bros Nigel Farrow and Paul Andrew Martin. That ceremony was conducted by a team of Past Masters, led by W Bro Bhuvi Bhalla.

At that same meeting, W Bro Richard Winter, Assistant Provincial Grand Master, presented Grand Lodge Certificates to Bros David Hitchcott and Simon Raw.



In March 2024, Bro Paul Clunn was Passed to the Second Degree. Again, I have been unable to locate any pictures taken on the evening but I do have picture of Bro Paul, at an event in July, when he was Installed as a Liveryman of the Corporation of the City of London, Livery Company Number 66 at the Mansion House, in the City of London.



Our April 2024 meeting allowed us to undertake a number of administrative functions, including the election of various individuals for next year, including Bro Matt Landy, the Senior Warden, as our Master Elect. #### A look back at Social Events since the last Newsletter

#### **Burns Night at the Masonic Hall**



January's Burns Night Dinner at the Masonic Hall organised by Taunton Lodge Liaison Group proved as popular as ever being starting with a Prosecco reception and the swirl of bagpipes played by a Piper in full tartan attire.

Burns Night traditions were upheld with the piping in of the haggis followed by its "killing" with appropriate words by W Bro Jack Leeming and tots of whisky raised in celebration.

After an excellent four course meal that included "neeps" and "tatties" as well as haggis the toasts were given in which members of Vivary played their part with Bro Richard Wilson proposing the Toast to the Immortal Memory of Robert Burns. The Toast to the Lassies was given by Bro Mike Marshall whose wife Lilian responded with the Toast to the Laddies.



#### **Vivary Visit to the Land Rover Heritage Collection.**

Over the summer break Richard Wilson managed to get exclusive access and a personalised tour of The Land Rover Heritage Collection.

Bro Simon from Guernsey was my guest at the last Vivary meeting and he has around 48 Land Rovers from Series 1-3, Defenders, Limited Editions, Working and Military Land Rovers, of which 35 are in a secret location in the Southwest.

Richard advertised this event on the Taunton Masonic Hall noticeboard and around 25 Brethren, family and friends turn up to have a look around.

Simon was on hand to talk us through his collection and explain the various designs and types of Land Rover many of which can only be seen in a museum.

The first two Land Rovers you can see in the pictures below are a 1949 series 1, one of the first Land Rovers in production, alongside that a 2015 Land Rover Defender, one of the last one off the production line, this is one Simon is particularly proud of as it has done less than 10 miles.



Several military vehicles were on display including a Pink SAS Series 2 which was used in the desert, also familiarly known as "the Pinkie".

There were various others on display, including a fire engine, a UN Bomb Proof vehicle, a St Johns Ambulance from Guernsey and an exceedingly rare, tracked Land Rover.

Finally, Richard thought he would bring his Land Rover along, which is a 1978 Series 3 Lightweight. This was an RAF vehicle and was based in Northern Ireland at the Strategic Air Command. The most exciting job it did was moving equipment around the airport, loading, and unloading planes hence a

tow hitch fitted on the front of the vehicle. Pictured below are Mrs Charity Steward (Sarah) and Richard in front of Richard's Land Rover, and some of the other Land Rovers in Simon's collection.

#### **Fruit Farm visit**

The life of a Lodge doesn't necessarily stop with the summer break from Masonry and it can be the perfect time for social events and on a typical English summer's evening Brethren of Vivary Lodge along with family members paid a visit to Thurloxton Fruit Farm. Here they were welcomed by fellow Vivarian Bro Edwin Quick who has farmed this land on the foothills of the Quantocks all his life, building from a 70 acre mixed farm to the diversified 500 acres today growing wheat, linseed, peas and oilseeds on the farm and running two flocks of sheep.



But it is best known in the area for its "Pick Your Own" business which was started by Edwin back in 1973 with just one acre of strawberries and now spreads to over 25 acres with a wide range of fruit and vegetables. Managing this and all the other farm's activities is now in the hands of Edwin's son, Andrew, who gave the Brethren a tour of fruit and vegetable fields and provided a fascinating insight into the operation.

30,000 strawberry plants are now grown on trestles which makes for easier picking and are irrigated by natural spring

water around 10 times a day through a computer managed system. As well as strawberries there are acres of raspberries, gooseberries, blackcurrants, redcurrants, broad beans, rhubarb and peas all solely grown for the Pick Your Own market.

Activity doesn't finish here with the end of the summer and the visitors were shown a newly sown area of sunflowers though which pathways will be created for people to pick sunflowers on the way. There



is also an extensive Pumpkin patch where prior to Halloween, besides being able to pick their own pumpkins, people will be able to carve them on site in a purpose built barn and take part in a spooky walk and games. After the exercise from this invigorating walk around the fields the group headed off for the village pub for a drink to reflect on the evening's event and of course to catch up on each other's news.

#### Hall Manager Hayley's Zip Wire Challenge

For those of you who don't do social media, Hayley carried out her Zip wire challenge on Sunday afternoon for Marie Curie Cancer Charity, at the Adrenaline Quarry Liskeard.



Just a few facts; the zip wire was 490mtrs long and 50mtrs high, for some of the older Brethren that's 1607ft long and around 160ft in height.

Vivary Lodge raised £234.40 which went towards Hayley's final total of just over £2000.
